## **Director Statement**

This film has been my passion, my sweat, and my energy for a full year now, and I could not be more proud of the final product. I've always had complicated feelings about mental illness diagnoses. Labels like anxiety disorder, obsessive compulsive disorder, and depression have been a constant source of comfort to myself and those around me. They make us feel seen. They make us feel curable. They make us feel like we aren't crazy. But over the past four years, I've learned just how rudimentary our understanding of mental illness really is. Our illness categories did not emerge from careful scientific research, but from similar symptomatology that "made sense" to group together. The truth is, we have a long way to go before we understand the inner workings of human suffering, and to do that we need to deconstruct our ideas of mental illness. This left me with a dilemma: how are we to validate the experiences of those suffering from mental illness, while critiquing the system it was built upon? Mental is my bold attempt to reconcile these two, seemingly conflicting viewpoints. I hope that through the interplay of informative interviews and emotional verité footage, viewers of this film walk away believing the crushing reality of mental illness, while understanding the need for serious reform in how we understand and study mental illness categories.
